Though Barrett died the night before Donald Trump took office, his reporting has trailed the president through the ensuing years, forming the basis of dozens of subsequent investigative pieces. Wayne spent decades chronicling the corrupt political and business milieu that produced Trump, along with Rudolph Giuliani, Roger Stone, Roy Cohn, Michael Cohen, and many lesser-known scoundrels who have faded into the patina of history. Working from a deep well of outrage, an abiding faith in the power of journalism and the sheer joy of digging for the truth, Barrett unmasked a parade of crooked pols and scam artists. His columns on the kickbacks, payoffs and special favors that loot the public till are methodical, fact-packed, eloquently written – and often delightfully fun – antidotes to the confusion and befuddlement of this post-truth era. Taken together they tell the story of the turn of the 21<sup>st</sup> century, how decisions steeped in racism and greed brought the city and the country to the precipice it is at today. *Without Compromise* is a call to action for the dogged, painstaking work of investigative reporting – and a reminder to keep fighting for what's true.
